

Communicatively Accessible Hearing Screenings


Presenting Our Pilot Project to the Canadian Stroke Congress 2015

We know that aphasia often leads to social isolation and depression, and can significantly impact quality of life. Undetected hearing loss, as well as participation in hearing screenings without communicative support tools, creates added barriers for people with aphasia.


Our speech-language pathologist, Lisa Samson, in collaboration with Joanne DeLuzio, Ph.D., Audiologist with the University of Toronto, created and piloted a communicatively accessible hearing screening protocol for people with aphasia, using specifically designed pictographic resources and Supported Conversation for Adults with Aphasia (SCATM).

We were selected as a highlighted poster for this year's Canadian Stroke Congress, with Lisa Samson presenting on this ground-breaking pilot project, *Conducting Communicatively Accessible Hearing Screenings for People with Aphasia.*

Clinicians and researchers in the aphasia and stroke communities have shown great interest in the resources that were developed for this project, which we hope to share very soon. This is one more example of the impact and importance our research has on individuals and their families living with aphasia.
